


Mission:

Our **VISION** is for people in southeast lowa to have the opportunity to reach their maximum potential.

History



- Community Action Agencies began by an act of legislation as a part of the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964 by President Lyndon Johnson. This was a part of his War on Poverty.
- Community Action of Southeast Iowa began in 1966.
- We are 1 of 16 in Iowa and 1 of over 1,000 across the nation.
- Each Community Action is different and responsive to local needs.
- Funding is provided through federal, state and local grants as well as local donations.



COVID-19

- All local centers remained providing services.
- An area survey was conducted to assess needs.
- Food pantry deliveries and increased rent and utility help were implemented.
- Head Start classrooms closed in March and went virtual.
- Head Start safely re-opened for a summer program to prepare 4 year olds for kindergarten in June and July.
- Head Start in-person and virtual classrooms re-opened in September.
- Services were adjusted to phone, drop off, pick up, no contact, and virtual visits.
- WIC received waivers and virtual permissions to provide needed nutrition and advice.
- Weatherization paused work on homes and resumed with safety precautions in July.
- All employees were paid throughout the pandemic.




- We are run by a tripartite board of 12-15 local Representatives.

- Home Visitors travel throughout the area







- Total area population: 105,290
- •We served 14,336 individuals in 6,152 households
- That's **13.62%** of the population of southeast lowa.

Poverty In Southeast Iowa

- 33.14% of the population is at 200% Federal Poverty Level (FPL) or below
 - That's **\$25,520** for one person and \$52,400 for a family of four.
- 12.20% are at 100% FPL
- Children are in poverty at a rate of 22.4% at 100% FPL
- •51.5% of children are eligible for free or reduced lunch
 - 185% FPL









Racial Demographics of Clients Served FY 2020






Ages of those served


Sources of Household Income










Is the average yearly savings in energy costs with our Weatherization Program Community in Southeast Iowa.



History Highlight



Passage of the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964 began the "War on Poverty" and led to the formation of Community Action Agencies in Iowa and across the United States. Soon after the federal government adapted its policy of working toward the elimination of poverty, groups of concerned individuals in this area began meeting to decide how best to fight poverty. They established goals and priorities and sought funding from the Office of Economic Opportunity (OEO).

Early on, these people recognized that our "haral" counties did not have large enough population bases to form their own Community Action Agencies. Therefore, the counties joined together. Initially, the Lee and Henry County groups joined forces and began their quest to become a private, non-profit corporation to help the low increase and otherwise disadvantaged. Soon they were joined by Des Moines and Washington Counties. Corporate status was granted in Navember of 1965 and Southeast lowa Community Action (now Community Action of Southeast lowa) applied for funding through OEO.
