Family Development and Self-Sufficiency Program

Who does FaDSS serve?

- Low-income Iowa families in all 99 counties
- All family members are: parents/caretakers and children
- In Fiscal Year 2022:
 - 92% had a female head of household
 - 52% had a head of household age 24 to 34
 - 51% were non-white
 - 98% had less than a college degree at entry

Family Development and Self-Sufficiency Program FY2022

FaDSS increases self-sufficiency for Iowa families, which reduces the use of the Family Investment Program (FIP) by FaDSS program participants.



240% Increased Employment

FaDSS families increased employment by 240% between program start and exit.



\$2,445.66 Increased Income

FaDSS families employed at program exit experienced an average increase in household income of \$2,445.66 per month.



\$1,033,373 FIP Savings

The increased employment and earnings of FaDSS program participants reduced FIP usage and resulted in \$1,033.373 of FIP savings to the State.



FAMILY DEVELOPMENT AND SELF-SUFFICIENCY (FADSS)

What is FaDSS?

- Evidence-informed program focusing on long-term change for low-income Iowa families.
- The Iowa Department of Human Rights collaborates with Community Action Agencies and other non-profit organizations to provide FaDSS in all 99 counties.
- Fiscal Year 2022: FaDSS served 2,322 families (including 2,398 children)

What services does FaDSS provide?

- Skill development, including:
 - Budgeting
 - Parenting
 - Healthy Behaviors
 - Self-advocacy

- Work readiness
- Community connections
- Help communities in understanding poverty
- Strengths and barriers assessments
- Goal-setting and attainment

Domestic Violence

68 FAMILIES EXPERIENCED DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

Mental Health Issues

580 Adults with substantiated mental health issues

> 89% ACCESSED TREATMENT

155 FAMILIES EXPERIENCED DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

> 83% ACCESSED TREATMENT

FAMILY DEVELOPMENT AND SELF-SUFFICIENCY (FADSS)

Families increased self-sufficiency

Housing: 32% of families improved

Child Care: 30% of families improved

Transportation: 31% of families improved

Support Network: 39% of families improved

FaDSS family wages generated savings in FIP.

\$7,727,658 TOTAL FADSS FAMILY WAGES

Improved level of employment at exit increased family income.

\$1,456 AVERAGE MONTHLY INCOME

\$1,189 increase in average monthly income

\$1,033,373

TOTAL FIP SAVINGS

670 families participated in FaDSS activities to increase work readiness.

190 adults exited FaDSS with a change in education status.
